What I Said Back in October...

"For the reasons discussed herein (and probably a few we haven't thought of), global supply chains will remain in a state of chaos for another eighteen months. As far as transportation and logistics costs go, they'll come down somewhat, but never to the levels seen prior to the Pandemic. In other words, 5-figure rates for ocean shipping from Asia to the U.S. are now a permanent part of the landscape".

2022 Outlook for Disruption & Delays

- Supply chain disruptions and delays will be around for as long as COVID-19 is (e.g. Vietnam, Ningbo, Vancouver, et al.)
 - As the risk of being "Mr. Negative" Climate Change events will combine with the Pandemic to create even greater mischief
- It will take four months to clean out the 2021 backlog
- Importer "Frontloading" is a thing, for sure
- Pay attention to known upcoming events
 - CNY, Winter Olympics, ILWU contract, Back to School

Quarterly CROP REPORTS

Ocean Freight Market Conditions & Pricing

- Large shippers have already negotiated their 2022 ocean freight contracts and in some instances, for multi-year periods
- The SS Lines are moving "down market" and approaching more shippers directly
- Ocean carriers will blank sailings to manipulate supply
- Carrier will continue to terminate bills of lading at the POD
- Rates will settle in the \$15-\$18k per FEU range
 - TEU rates won't be far behind



Other Service & Pricing Considerations (Port/Rail Drayage and Transload)

- The port & rail drayage market will continue to be tight, chaotic and more expensive
 - Equipment & labor shortages, increased costs
- Pay close attention to Free Time, Demurrage & Detention
- Keep an eye on the FMC and the 2021 Ocean Shipping Reform Act
- Tighten up your relationships with forwarders and customs brokers
